NASELLE, Wash. - On September 23rd, 2010 the Pacific County Sheriff's Office responded to the Naselle area after a citizen reported that her husband and three dogs were missing in the woods near mile post 8 on SR 401. The missing person was a 64 year old male that had entered the area to pick mushrooms. His family called after he failed to return to his vehicle.
